FROZEN ON THE MINNESOTA PRAIRIE

with Carolyn Sowinski

March 9, 2023 at 7:00 p.m.



The Cottonwood County Historical Society will host a book talk featuring Kandiyohi County native, Carolyn Mankell Sowinski, at the museum. She has written a book about a 3-day blizzard which occurred 150 years ago. In her book, **The Great Storm: Minnesota's Victims in the Blizzard of January 7, 1873**, Sowinski has identified 84 people from 31 counties in the state who died in this storm. In her presentation Sowinski will share the story of Cottonwood County

victim, William Norris, an Irish immigrant and Civil War veteran who lived in Springfield Township with his family. Sowinski will read excerpts about the storm, highlight some historic documents about the victim, and provide helpful hints when doing research. She will have books for sale at the event (cash or check). The author has five books about her ancestors and Minnesota history available on Amazon.com.



Excerpt from Windom Reporter—January 16, 1873 Last Week's Storm

The three day's storm of last week was one of the severest ever known in this section. It began on Tuesday afternoon, the wind changing from the south to the northwest in an instant and filling the air so full of snow that one could not see an object a rod (16.5 feet) distant. It continued its fury till Thursday night when it stopped for a "rest". The morning of Tuesday being very pleasant, farmers came to town and did not venture to go home but for one or two instances. The barns and blacksmith shops were crowded with horses and cattle and the hotels with men. At present writing we hear of but one person perishing in this vicinity. It seems that Wm. Norris, living a few miles west of here, had been absent, (we think at Heron Lake) and was returning home when the storm came up, and had come within 80 rods of his house, when he succumbed to death.

.....Mr. Grimes, of the Windom House, caused his family and friends some uneasiness by not returning from String Lakes on the memorable Tuesday night referred to, where he went in the morning. The storm found him and his team on the prairies, and being unable to "side track," kept along with the storm and ran into a stable about four o'clock where he remained till Calvin Rank shoveled him out on Wednesday evening. He came home on Thursday afternoon in as good spirits as ever.

An Indigenous Hero Story Carved on the Red Rock Ridge



Tom Sanders is the retired Site Manager of the Jeffers Petroglyphs State Historic Site and continues his research through the Red Rock Ridge Research Group, whose mission is to preserve the Red Rock Ridge.

The Ho Chunk and Iowa people who lived in southwestern Wisconsin and southern Minnesota tell stories of a hero named Red Horn. He was sent by the creator to protect the people. This story is more than a thousand years old. He was called Red Horn because he formed his hair into one long braid, stiffened it with fat, and painted it red. In the petroglyph photograph to the left you can see the image of a human with his head, arms and torso. It appears to be wearing large earrings and has one horn projecting from the side of his head. Red Horn wore large earrings in the shape of human heads. The horn in the image could represent Red


Horn's red braid. Some images adjacent to the possible Red Horn seem to tell elements of one of his adventures. Below and to our right is a giant human image with its head missing because the rock has broken away. Red Horn raced the giants to gain the hand of one of their daughters. To the right of the giant is an arrow. To win the race against the long-legged giants, he changed into an arrow, the fastest thing known to people at that time. To the right of the arrow is a wolf/dog about to follow a trail of an animal signified by the pairs of dots below it. In the stories, Wolf accompanied Red Horn on his hunts. To our left and below is a thunderbird, another companion of Red Horn, called Storms-as-he walks. Perhaps the large footprints near Red Horn represent the giants or footprints left in the ground after the race.


